EXCURSIONS, EVENTS & EATS

Socialization and building relationships are important parts of Calvary's program.

Students participate in monthly after-school activities which are spearheaded by Calvary's seniors. Students also attend regular field trips to visit colleges and explore the communities in which envelop them. These college field trips are on a four-year rotation with different grade levels visiting different campuses.

COLLEGE/CAREER

Students participate in a college and career curriculum which includes interest inventories, college selection and application assistance, PSAT/SAT testing, financial aid including scholarships, and more!

TRAVEL ABROAD

In alternating years, high school students get to explore the world and take part in service opportunities in a foreign country. There is a college credit option available for those students who wish to apply. Peru is our high school's 21-22 destination.

SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

Students participate in three Chapel services per week where our Episcopalian identity is celebrated. High School students take on leadership roles during these services. The other two days are devoted to Christian Character Education which engages students in discussions about ethical and moral issues focusing on our 3 R's - Reverence for God, Respect for Others and Responsibility for Self. Along with building servants' hearts through Service Learning and our Biblical Studies program, students' spiritual development is an important part of their CEP journey.

NOURISH & FLOURISH

Once a month, students meet during their lunch period to hear from active professionals in a variety of careers talk about their positions and the educational path they took to get there. Students learn about obstacles and challenges the presenter encountered and the soft skills necessary for their success in that field. Students have heard from a project director at Apple, a cyber security expert, plastic surgeon, an attorney and more!

SERVICE LEARNING

Students are expected to earn 30 hours of community service either through school-based or self-initiated events or activities, for a total of 120 hours over a four-year period. In order to deepen connections and understanding, at least half of the community service hours (60), are required to be earned in one field.
